# Van Gogh: PRE-VISIT

#### **CONTEXT & BACKGROUND**

Vincent Van Gogh was part of a group of French artists in the late 1800s working to paint in new and creative ways. They did not follow the old rules and art styles. Instead, they experimented with bold colors, strong textures and surprising contrasts.

### **TIMELINE**

1853 born in Zundert in the Netherlands

1877 moved to Amsterdam

**1880** moved to Brussels and began studying art making

**1885** completed *The Potato Eaters,* his first major painting

1888 painted Starry Night

1890 painted Undergrowth with Two Figures

1890 died in France at age 37

Many of these artists used symbolism as another way to communicate. Instead of using art to show the outside world, these Post-Impressionist artists used art to display their inner thoughts and feelings.

Van Gogh was inspired by the style and creativity of Japanese artists and as well as other European artists who painted nature scenes.

### **Elements of Art**

Color: visible light spectrum; includes warmth, coolness, saturation, and hue

Color Theory: Primary, Secondary, Complementary, Analogous

ASK What colors do you see? How do the colors interact with each other?

**Texture:** tactile quality on an object (real or perceived)

ASK What textures do you see? On which objects? Are they real or implied?

# Principles of Design

Movement: Direction of your eyes around a composition

ASK Is there movement in this work? Describe what you see.

# **Style**

Post-Impressionism: stressed importance of color and emotions

ASK How does this painting make you feel? Why?

## Composition

Sous-bois: the forest interior

ASK What is left out of these paintings that is often visible in other landscapes?
